Death of Mrs. Eli Knapp

Mrs. Ada E. Knapp, wife of Eli M. Knapp, died at her home in Stella at 6 o'clock a. m. Wednesday, October 23, 1907, after an illness of but a few days.

The deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. P. Peabody of Nemaha. She was born and grew to womanhood on the old home farm in Aspinwall precinct, and on Nov. 26, 1902, was united in marriage to Eli M. Knapp. To this union a daughter was born, who is left motherless at the tender age of three years. To the bereaved husband, daughter, parents, brothers and sisters we extend heartfelt sympathy.

The deceased was of a loving and cheerful disposition and a most devoted wife and daughter. She leaves to mourn her loss a husband, little daughter, parents, five sisters and two brothers.

The funeral services, conducted by Rev. J. W. Sapp, were held at the Christian church in Nemaha at 2 o'clock p. m. Thursday. The church was crowded and a great many could not get in. Many came over from Stella. Interment was in the Nemaha cemetery.

The deceased was born Nov. 11, 1882, and was 24 years, 11 months and 12 days old at her death.

A Bad Accident

Wednesday afternoon Mart Quiller and Pinkney Shiveley drove down to the Cooper farm south of town, with their guns and fishing tackle, to spend a few hours hunting and fishing. They stopped along the banks of the creek. About the middle of the afternoon Mart started to fix something about his fishline and leaned his gun against Pinkney. The gun fell to the ground and was discharged, the entire load entering Mart's right leg about an inch above the ankle joint, near the back of the leg, ranging around to the front, the entire load lodging in front under the skin. The flesh on the outside of the leg was torn and shot to pieces. The shot went through the pants, shoe and sock, and particles of cloth, leather, wads, shot, powder and gun dirt were lodged in the flesh. No bones were fractured but shot were stuck in the bone and had to be pulled out. If the discharge had struck an inch lower the ankle joint would have been shattered.

Mart was brought home as soon as possible and Dr. Frazier phoned for. The doctor had been at Auburn and was on his way home. Dr. Lutgen of Auburn was also sent for. When the doctors arrived they cleaned out the wound thoroughly and took every precaution against blood poisoning. This is what is now feared. If this can be warded off it is thought Mart will soon recover and will not suffer any permanent bad effects.
