A change has been made with Burlington conductors on trains running past Nemaha. Grandma Hall, one of the aged pioneers of Nemaha county, died at the home of her son, Mark Hall, in Auburn, Saturday, Feb. 1, 1908, aged 91 years and 22 days. The funeral services, conducted by Rev. J. W. Sapp, were held at the Christian church at Brownville on Monday.

Anna E. Lyell was born in Tennessee Jan. 9, 1817. At an early age she was married to Wm. Hall. To this union nine children were born, of whom two daughters and three sons survive. With her husband and children she came to Nemaha county, Nebraska, in 1855, and has made this county her home ever since. Her husband died about 31 years ago. At the age of 18 years Mrs. Hall became a member of the Baptist church, and later united with the Christian church, and lived a consistent christian life.

A Sad Case

Last Saturday Mrs. Ed Thomas of Aspinwall precinct became a raving maniac. She burned a new pair of overshoes and a pair of good shoes. She did not try to injure herself or any one else, but raved, danced, sang, and talked wildly. The authorities at Auburn were notified, and Wednesday afternoon Deputy Sheriff Henderson came down and the next morning took her to the asylum at Lincoln. Her husband and Miss Mattie Fisher went along.

This is the third time Mrs. Thomas has been to the asylum. She was brought home the last time last August, and though not fully restored it was thought she was better at home.

Mrs. Thomas has a family of seven children, the youngest, the only boy, being only a year and a half old. The husband and children have the sympathy of all in their time of trial, which is worse than death.

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A Cure for Hog Cholera

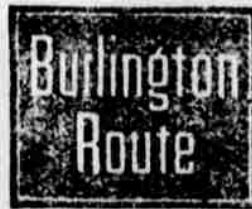
Washington, D. C., Feb. 3, '08. During the hearings before the congressional agricultural committee recently Dr. Melvin of the bureau of animal industry made the statement that they had discovered a cure for hog cholera. Congressman Pollard asked, "Are your scientists able to go into a lot of hogs that are infected with this malady and by applying this remedy prevent the continued mortality of the herd?" Answer: "Yes, sir, they have done that." "After it has broken out?" "Yes, sir; not only our own men but in some of the states." "What per cent can you save in a herd of that kind?" "I do not know definitely. I think I would be safe in saying 98 per cent. We have gone into herds where the disease was prevalent and treated one-half of the herd and left the other half untreated, and nearly all the untreated hogs would die and the others would survive. This has been done in a number of instances."

Upon learning that no co-operative work along this line had been undertaken in connection with the Nebraska station, Mr. Pollard took the matter up with Prof. E. A. Burnett of Lincoln and has just received word that Dr. Melvin had recently been in Lincoln and discussed the matter with Prof. Burnett and Dr. Peters of the Nebraska station.

The method requires an expert to administer it but it is hoped that a system can be arranged whereby it will be possible for the farmer to handle it himself.

Mr. Pollard says if there are any epidemics of hog cholera existing in the First district he will be glad to take the matter up with the department with the view of having an expert sent to the neighborhood who will be prepared to administer the treatment to the diseased herds if the existence of such epidemic is brought to his attention.
