
Filley Man so Badly Cut He Cannot

Test Free High School Law.

The free high school law passed by the last legislature is to be the subject of a combined attack from seevral school districts in Richardson county for the purpose of testing the validity of this act. For 12 years various persons in the office of the state superintendent have tried to secure the adoption of a valid free high school law, a law that will permit a valuation of railroad property and pupil living in a district where there is no high school to attend a high school, the cost of his tuition to be paid by a county or district tax. Two or three such laws have been declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. Senator King of Polk introduced S. F. 217 in the last legislature and it became a law. It provides for the payment of 75 cents a week by each non-resident pupil, the district of his residence to raise the money by taxation.
