#### School Board Reorganized

The regular meeting of the school board was held Monday night. The board was organized by the election of J. W. Sapp president, Frank Titus secretary and C. L. Russell treasurer. J. W. Sapp, J. A. Stephenson and Mrs. C. H. Kindig were elected committee on rules and course of study. Frank Titus and J. A. Stephenson were appointed a committee to repair the school building and were directed to have the north part of the building spouted and a cistern put in. J. A. Stephenson was appointed a committee to cut out surplus trees on the north part of the grounds. After some discussion about hiring a fourth teacher it was decided to wait until after the special meeting, and the board adjourned until July 27.

#### An Old Check Paid

In looking through some old books last week Peter Kerker found a check for \$4.90 that he had never cashed. The check was given by W. T. Banks to E. Griffin, dated March 9, 1888, and was drawn on the old Nemaha City bank, then owned by Noe & Early. Mr. Griffin got Mr. Kerker to cash the check, endorsing it. It was found July 9, 1908, twenty years and four months after it was issued. The interest at 8 per cent would amount to \$7.94. Mr. Kerker wrote to Mr. Banks, who is now at North Platte, enclosing the check and explaining the circumstances, and had ten of Tom's old friends who lived here twenty years ago sign a statement that they recognized his signature. Monday Mr. Kerker got a letter from Tom, enclosing a check for the \$4.90, but it was drawn in favor of Peter Kerker, Worthy Frazier, Frank Titus, C. P. Barker, Earle Gilbert, Ben Baldwin, Ben Colerick, W. W. Sanders, J. E. Crother, W. Hadlock and J. H. Littrell—the holder of the original check and the ten who had O. K.'d it. Since then Pete has been hustling to get these ten men to endorse the check so he can get the money on it. Tom has shown that his checks are good even if the holder does keep them for twenty years before presenting them for payment.

#### The Public Schools

It should be understood that no matter what action is taken at the special school meeting next Tuesday night, regarding putting in a fourth teacher, the tax this year will be the same, as the special meeting has no power to make a change in this respect.

If the fourth teacher is added and a 25 mill tax is levied, the additional cost to a farmer whose land is valued at \$100 per acre for taxable purposes will be just 15 cents per acre more than last year. As an instance. E. E. Moore's farm of 111 acres is valued at \$100 per acre. The assessed value is \$20 per acre. Last year the school levy was 17 1-2 mills. If we have a 25 mill levy this year it will be an increase of 7 1-2 mills, or 15 cents per acre increase. On 111 acres this will amount to \$16.65. At present it would take just a little over 22 bushels of corn to pay this increase—less than a peck to the acre.

If the special meeting votes against the fourth teacher it is probable the school board will decide to make the school a nine grade one, as it is practically impossible to carry ten grades with only three teachers.

It is urged that the increased tax caused by adding a fourth teacher will be burdensome on parties owning farms in the district. A man who owns a good farm can pay his proportion of the tax much easier than the poor man who owns a home and earns his living by day's work can pay his proportion. Another thing, not a man who owns a farm in the district but what bought it when we were paying 25 mills school tax, had a heavy floating indebtedness, and most of the time a bonded indebtedness besides.

Some of the heavier taxpayers have said they thought us fellows who are not fortunate enough to own much property, and therefore do not pay much taxes, ought not to vote taxes on those who pay most of it. If we adopt this view of it, and let the property decide and not the voter, the Burlington railroad company would have a big voice in it, as it pays over one-third of the tax in the district. But no one would be in favor of this.

Vote the way you think is for the best interests of the largest number, keep sweet, and cheerfully abide by the result.

The school law makes it the duty of the school board to hire such teachers as they deem necessary. No annual meeting nor any other meeting has power to dictate to the board how many teachers they shall hire. There has been money enough voted to pay the expense of four teachers, and this action cannot be changed this year. We will have to pay the tax. But the school board will abide by the decision of the voters as to hiring the fourth teacher, and every voter in the district should be present at the meeting next Tuesday night.

All persons who have been residents of the district for the preceding 40 days, and who have property in the district assessed to them at the last assessment, or who have children of school age, are entitled to vote.
