6TH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT. Call For Congressional Convention For Sixth Nebraska District.

A republican congressional convention for the Sixth Congressional District of Nebraska will be held in the City of Crawford, Neb., on Thursday, June 12, 1902, at 1:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for congress to be voted for at the election to be held for said district on November 4, 1902, and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The harmony that prevailed in the republican county convention Tuesday, is a forecast of the increased majority that will be shown on election day.

Custer county republicans, as they are entitled, will roll up the largest majority this fall that has been recorded by that party since the advent of the Alliance movement.

From nearly every locality in Custer county comes reports of new recruits to the republican ranks from the fusion forces. Some of these were delegates to the county convention held in this city Tuesday.

The Custer County Republican Convention is the first on record in favor of amending the revenue laws so as to bring about an equality of taxation of real estate, personal property and franchises in the state.

It is reported that the Boer war has cost the English government up to April last \$1,114,870,000. To this should be added the cost of April and May and the indemnity fund, the latter of which is 3,000,000 pounds.

In the selection of A. R. Humphrey as candidate for county attorney, the republican convention choose wisely. His election means an able, yet conservative, prosecutor, of whom his constituents will have reason to be proud.

Governor Savage's speech before the republican county convention was full of valuable information concerning the administration of the affairs of the state and was very much appreciated by those who were fortunate enough to hear it.

Peace In South Africa.

The entire civilized world rejoice with the combatants that terms of peace have been agreed upon between the English and the Boers. The Boers have had the sympathy of the friends

of human liberty in their struggle from the first and their courage and temporary success upon the fields of battle manifested from time to time has been admitted by many. The terms of peace are very reasonable when considered in the light of the superior strength of the British. South Africa which has been the scene of warfare has been made desolate. The British agrees to contribute 3,000,000 pounds to indemnify the farmers and others who have lost their property and provide for their needs until they can again start. All will be given the right of suffrage except English subjects who joined the enemy. They will be disfranchised for life. None will be subject to the death penalty. It was far from being an unconditional surrender and it is reported that the terms are highly satisfactory to a large majority of both sides.

Republican County Convention.

In pursuant to call the republican county convention was convened in Broken Bow, Tuesday, June 3. The session was called to order by A. Morgan, chairman of the County central committee. The central committee having selected Senator Currie as temporary chairman he was introduced by Mr. Morgan. In accepting the position Senator Currie complimented the people on the prosperous condition of the country and expressed his gratitude for the honor conferred. D. M. Amsberry was elected temporary secretary and Tom Wright assistant.

On motion of W. S. Delano, the chairman was authorized to appoint a committee of three on credentials.

Moved by S. L. Cannon that a committee of three be appointed on order of business and a committee of five on resolutions. Carried.

On motion of Smith Waterbury a committee of three was appointed on permanent organization.

On motion convention adjourned to 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention was called to order. While waiting for the committees report, Gov. Savage was called to the platform, who spoke at length on the affairs of the state finances and advancement on the present administration. On motion by Joe Heaffle the convention expressed its thanks to the governor for his diligence in the business affairs of the state.

The committee on credentials reported all the townships fully represented and that the delegates present be entitled to sit. Report adopted.

Committee on permanent organizations reported that the temporary organization be made permanent. Report adopted.

The committees report on order of business was adopted as follows:

- 1. Report of committee on resolutions. 2. Nomination of candidate for county attorney. 3. Election of delegates to the state convention. 4. Election of delegates to the senatorial convention. 5. Election of delegates to the representative convention. 6. Selection of County Central Committee.

On motion of J. O. Taylor the rules were suspended and A. R. Humphrey was nominated as candidate for County Attorney

by acclamation. Mr. Humphrey was called to the platform and in a short speech thanked the convention for the honor and assured the convention that he would be found in the field until the close of the campaign for the nominees of the republican ticket.

On motion a committee of one from each township was chosen by the delegates of their respective townships to nominate delegates to the several conventions. The committee so constituted was composed of the following:

The following are the resolutions adopted by the convention: The republicans of Custer county in convention assembled, reaffirm the principles of republicanism as set forth in the national platform of 1900.

We congratulate the people upon the happiness and prosperity that has come to them as a result of republican policy and legislation. Wages were never so high, nor producers so well compensated for their products as now. Men were never so well housed, clothed and fed, and have never before had more contentment of mind than during the years since republican policy has been enacted into law.

We congratulate the President and the Army on the satisfactory progress made in the Philippines in suppressing the insurrection and establishing order, and we unqualifiedly endorse the policy of our government therein. Our flag is in the Philippines and there it will remain until such time as the American people may deem it expedient or proper to give the islands a free and independent government, such as it has just given Cuba.

The American Army has taken up the work of maintaining authority in the Philippines, and while we deplore and severely condemn any instances of cruelty which may have occurred, we remember our soldiers are fighting a barbarous and treacherous foe which has inflicted most revolting and inhuman atrocities upon its prisoners. It is the Nation's Army drawn from every section of our country, knowing no politics nor creed, but fighting the Nation's battles under the Nation's Flag; and we resent with indignation, the recent democratic efforts to drag its honor in the dust and cast reproach upon its fair name.

We congratulate the republican party for the faithful fulfillment of the pledge made at its national convention of 1900, to give the oppressed island of Cuba a free and independent government, which

was consummated at Havana on May 20, by the withdrawal of the American troops and the turning over of its government to its own people.

We commend our present county officials for their business like methods in the administration of county affairs.

We congratulate the people of Nebraska upon the present prosperity of our state, and we commend the business like and economic methods employed by Gov. Savage and the state officials of his administration, which have resulted in a saving to the state in comparison with preceding administrations of nearly two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Be it further

RESOLVED, That we disapprove of the inequality of the present methods of the assessment of property for taxation, there being no two counties assessed upon the same basis. We therefore demand that our revenue laws of the state be amended so that every dollar's worth of property or franchises shall be assessed at its actual cash value and that the levies be decreased to the lowest possible number of mills, that will provide sufficient revenue for county and state purposes. Be it further

RESOLVED, That it be made the duty of the attorney general and county attorney to see that the law is properly enforced; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recommend the calling of a constitutional convention in the near future, or that the question of amendments to the constitution be submitted to the people of the state for their ratification.

With the understanding that the Hon. E. M. Currie is a candidate for the position of congressman from this congressional district; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we recognize in Mr. Currie his eminent fitness for the place; and as a mark of our confidence, we do hereby authorize him to name the delegation to represent his interest in the congressional convention.
