Broken Bow Will Celebrate the Fourth.

The Citizens Have Decided to Have One of the Biggest Celebrations Ever Held in the County July 4th.

Noted Speakers Will be Secured and a Fine Program Arranged.

FIRE WORKS IN THE EVENING.

At a meeting of the business men held in the court house Monday evening, it was decided to celebrate the 4th of July in Broken Bow this year.

The meeting was organized by electing F. M. Rublee chairman, and John Lyell secretary.

The question of the advisability of holding a celebration was quite generally discussed and the preponderance of the opinion was that the city owed a good celebration to the county, and that the thing to do was to plan to have the biggest celebration ever held in the county. The vote was unanimous in favor of celebrating. It was estimated that at least \$600 would be required to get up a proper entertainment.

The object being to provide entertainment and a good time for all the people of the county that wished to visit Broken Bow. It was generally understood that most localities desire to come to Broken Bow this year as the city had been giving away for the other towns for several years past.

Notice To Farmers.

In going over the B. & M. in the central and western part of the state, I note an unfavorable condition in a large precinct of the wheat and oat fields, caused by the heavy rains in the early part of May.

The surface is packed and crusted, and spots of a greater or less magnitude in nearly all fields have a light green color, and the leaves are narrow and point straight up. While the dying out by evaporation has much to do with this, there is another trouble, the lack of air, which is shut out by this crust. The peers of this crust are daily being made smaller by the upward movement of the magnesia salts and alkalis. These are being brought to the surface by the moisture, which is, under this condition, fast escaping.

WHEN AND HOW TO HARROW.

Don't get into grain that is six or more inches high when the dew is on. Wait just long enough in the morning for the blades to dry off, and no longer. Set the teeth slightly slanting, not too much, and as a rule harrow crosswise of the rows. Break the surface thoroughly.

Grain that is six inches high or over, thick, with good width of blades and of good color, needs no harrowing.

If this advice seems too radical, then just try a part of your field, even a small part, and in two weeks be kind enough to report to me the results.
