the city of Broken Bow:
Section 1. The councilmen of the city o
Broken Bow shall each receive the sum of \$50.00 per year for their services as such councilmen per year for their services as such councilmen to be paid in quarterly installments at the end of each quarter and the city marshal and street commissioner, which said offices are hereby consolidated, shall receive for his services the sum of \$50.00 per month, to be paid at the end

of each and every month.

Section 2. Every person who shall within the corporate limits of the city of Broken Bow bet any money or other thing of value upon upon any horse race, base ball game or other

on any horse race, base ball game or other athletic game or games shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not exceeding \$100.00, and shall stand committed to jail until such fine and costs be paid.

Section 3. Every person who shall resist or abuse any peace officer of this city in the proper discharge of his duties, the person so offending shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00 or shall be imprisioned in jail not exceeding 3 months at the discretion of the court and where, in such case a fine is imposed the defendant shall stand committeed to jail until snot fine and costs are paid.

Section 4. If any person shall unlawfully assault or threaten another in a menacing manner or shall unlawfully strike or wound another within the city of Broken Bow, the person so offending shall, upon conviction thereof before the Police Judge of said city, be fined in any sum not less than \$10,00 and not more than \$50,00 at the discretion of the court and in the event of the imposition of the fine as provided by this section, he shall stand com-mitted to jail until such fine and costs are paid.

Provided, that a conviction under this section
shall not relieve the person convicted from
liability to respond in damages at the suit of
the injured party.


