

**The Nebraska State Fair for 1894**  
Located at Omaha.

LINCOLN, January 16.—The principal business before the board of agriculture today was the location of the fair. Proposals were introduced by representatives from Omaha, Lincoln and Grand Island offering grounds, buildings, etc., for the location of the fair for a term of five years. Each deputation of citizens presented the advantages of the localities in an able manner, and the whole forenoon was spent in the discussion. Finally Burks, of Lincoln, proposed to withdraw the Driving Park's proposition, provided the board locate the fair at Omaha for one instead of five years. No propositions for one year had been offered and the board granted an opportunity to revise the propositions. After more discussion, Judge Savage offered a resolution "that the state fair be located at Omaha for one year, provided the Driving Park association grant the same terms as last year." The resolution was carried by an almost unanimous vote. The general opinion among the members seemed to be that the fair should not be located at any one place more than one year as at present, owing to the rapid changes going on in the state. The board appointed J. F. Kinney delegate to the national turf congress, to be held at New York in February.

The board of horticulture had a very interesting meeting. The day was consumed in the discussion of topics relating to fruit tree culture and varieties of fruits. The display of winter apples was the finest ever made in the state. The fruit was arranged on four long tables, and consisted of 152 plates, containing different varieties, and entered by nine competitors. They presented a fine appearance.

**Nebraska State Farmers' Alliance.**

KEARNY, Neb., January 17.—The Nebraska State Farmers' Alliance concluded a two days' session to-night. After transaction of routine business a platform was adopted declaring in favor of national and state legislation to regulate railway traffic with both a maximum and minimum rates, and demand the abolition of the national banks and the substitution of a currency by the government direct; to oppose protection and demand a tariff for revenue only; express sympathy with labor and ask protection for labor. Organization was recommended for the abolition of convict labor. They ask congress to reclaim all unearned land grants and reserve the public domain for the actual settlers and oppose the acquisition of public lands by foreigners. A resolution was also passed endorsing the conduct of Senator Van Wyck. The alliance has taken measures to recognize and its members will continue an independent party movement.
