THE debate in the Senate the other day upon the bill to increase the salaries of the Federal Judges in the District Courts to \$5,000, evoked some very entertaining statements from Senators who opposed the bill, touching the nepotism that had characterized the management of these courts, both North and South, during the last twenty years. Mr. Coke, of Texas, declared that for a score of years there had not been a Judge of the United States Court in his State, whose nepotism in securing the appointment of relatives to places in and about the courts, had not become a matter of public scandal. And what Mr. Coke says of Texas is equalled if not surpassed in many other States, conspicuous among which is that immaculate old Commonwealth of Massachusetts, where the memory of man runneth not back to the time when Peleg Sprague was not Judge of the United States District Court, and his brother clerk of the same court for I don't know how many years. There was Blodgett, of Chicago, who came within an ace of being impeached a few years ago, who had more relatives than Enoch but who contrived to find places for about all of them at the Government feed-trough. Going back further, we discover that old Judge Nelson, afterwards on the Supreme Bench of the United States, had his son for clerk in his court in the Northern District of New York, and that son, by the way, is the Judge of the United States District Court for Minnesota, and one of the best Judges on the Federal Bench. And there was Judge Hanna, of Indiana, who managed to take care of his son and brother, and I don't know how many other relatives, but I do know that the instances were rare when the name of Hanna was not attached to about every document emanating from the Court, whether as Judge, Clerk, Commissioner, or otherwise. And so it has gone on all through the gamut of States and Territories from time immemorial until now Congress has set its foot down upon it with an emphasis that will effectually check it-the pres-

### ORDINANCE NO. 13.

To Amend Section 3 of an Ordinance Providing for Licensing and Regulating the Sale of Malt, Spirituous and Vinous Liquors.

BEIT ORDAINED, By the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the Village of McCook: Sec. 1. That section 3 of an ordinance providing for licensing and regulating the sale of malt, spirituous and vinous liquors be amended so as to read as follows :

Sec. 3. Before such license shall be granted the applicant shall pay into the Treasury of the Village of McCook, for the use and support of the common school of the school district No. 17, in the County of Red Willow, in the State of Nebraska, at the rate of six hundred and fifty (\$650) dollars per year, and shall be issued for the unexpired part of the fiscal or municipal year for which such license is grantmunicipal year for which such license is granted. No license shall be issued for a period of less than one month, nor for any fractional part of a month. The applicant shall take the Village Treasurer's receipt for said amount in duplicate and file the same with the Village Clerk before such license shall be issued, and the Village Treasurer shall credit to the account of said school district all meneys now in his hands and which shall hereafter come into his hands, from license heretofore issued and his hands, from license heretofore issued and hereafter to be issued, for the sale of malt. spirituous and vinous liquors within the Vil-lage of McCook, which moneys shall constitute a school fund and be used for the sole use and benefit of said school district, and no part of said money shall be used for any other pur-pose whatever, and the Village Treasurer shall disburse said money for the use and benefit of said school district in the same manner as oth-er moneys belonging to said school district. SEC 2. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with this ordinance are sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and e in force from and after its passage, approv-
