The Commanding Officer Makes Official Report Regarding the Same.

The following is Lieutenant Greely's official report of the execution of Private Henry, made to the adjutant general:

"I have the honor to report that on June 6, 1884, at Camp Ciay, near Cape Sabin, Grinnell Land, it became necessary for me to order the military execution of Private Charles R. Henry. Fifth cavalry. The order was given in writing on my undivided responsibility, being deemed absolutely essential for the safety of the surviving members of the expedition. Ten had already died of starvation, and two more lay at the point of death. The facts inducing my action were as follows:

Provisions had been stolen in November, 1883, and Henry's complicity therein was more than suspected. On March 24, 1884, the party nearly perished from asphyxia. While several men were unconscious, and while efforts were being made for their restoration, Private Henry stole about two pounds of bacon from the mess stores. He was not only seen by the E kimo Jens and Edwards, but his stomach being overloaded, he threw up the undigested bacon. An open investigation was held, and every member of the party declared him guilty of these and other thefts. A clamor for his life was raised, but was repressed by me. I put him under surveil ance until our waning strength rendered his physical services indispensable. Later he was found one day intoxicated, having stolen liquor on hand for med cinal use. A second time his life was demanded, but again spared him. On June 5th a theft of provisions, on his part, having been re-ported to me, I had a conversation with him, in walcu I appealed to his practical sense, pointing out that it was necessary to our preservation. He promised entire re-formation, but distrusting him, I issued a written order that he should be shot if detected stealing. On June 6th he not only stole part of the shrimps for our breakfas, but visiting unauthorized our winter camp stole certain se I skins reserved for food. I then ordered him to be shot. On his person was found a silver chronograph abandoned by me at Fort Conger and stolen by him. In his bag was found a large quantity of sealskins and a pair of seaskin boots stolen a few days before from the hunter. Suspecting complicity on the part of several, I ordered his execution by three of the most reliable men. After his death the order was read to the entire party and concurred in by every member as being not only just but essential to our safety. To avoid pub-lic scandal, I ordered that no man speak of the matter until the official report was made of the facts. I have the honor to request that a court of inquiry be ordered, or a court martial be convened, should the honorable secretary of war deem it advisable. In this case I have thought it best not to ask written statements of the surviving members of the party for appendices to the re-port, lest I might seem to be tampering with them. I have not asked since our rescue, on Jane 22d, whether their opinions concurring in my action have changed or not, leaving such questions to your action, if deemed requisite. I naturally regret that circumstances imposed such terrible responsibility upon me, but I am conscientious in the belief that I should have failed in my duty to the rest of my party had I no. acted promptly and summarily. EXHUMING LIEUT. KISLINGBURY'S BODY. Rochester (N. Y.) 'dispatch: The most heart-rendering disclosures were made in this city this morning regarding the remains of Lieut. Kisingbury, of the Arc-tic expedition, who died amid the Arctic snow last June. It is established beyond all question that cannibalism was resorted to by the starving men of the Greely expedition, and shows that the lives of those saved were preserved only by eating the dead bodies of their companions. Lieut. Kislingbury's relatives here were filled with horrible doubts as soon as they learned that disclosures had been made in New York regarding campibals on a supersection. garding cannibalism among the members of the expedition, and they determined to learn the truth by exhuming the remains and have them examined by competent physicians. The services of an undertaker were secured, and this morning, with the assistance of five men, he accomp ished the work of taking up the casket from its resting place. The casket was opened in the presence of Frank Kislingbury and John P. Kislingbury, brothers of the deceased; Dr. Charles Buckley, D. F. A. Menlevine, Superintendent Sto son, Assistant Superintenden Mandeville and two reporters of the Post-Expre s. The work of opening the heavy iron recept cie was found comparatively easy, all there was to do being to unscrew the fifty-two iron bolts which held down the lid. The noiseless care with which the latter was freed from its bed showed there was an absence of gas in the casket and it was feared that there might be no body in the casket at all. Feeling his way into the mass of cotton waste which filled the coffin to the top, the undertaker soon exclaimed: "He is there." Astrong odor of alcohol, but no very strong suggestions of decay, emanated from the casket. Dr. Buckley, who had put on a pair of black feather gloves, uncovered the lower portion of the coffin and then it appeared as one of the legs-the right one-was missing, but when the waste was all removed it became apparent that the limb was fied under the left one. A basket was next placed upon the floor and the enshrouded form taken from it and placed upon a table. The unkertaker and physicians now began and cut the stitches and unwound the white the eting which formed the first covering. The sacet was taken away. A tarred rope entwining a blanket was cut and the work of taking off this last covering began. Sowly the blanket was removed. The blackened, flush ess face, showing marks of Arctic soil, bore no semulance to the dead man. The skin was dried to the .kuil, and the sightless socke s and half-opened mout's gave the dead man a look of mute, appealing agony. The re-mains were completely identified as those of Louis Kishngbury. The physicians made a thorough examination and the rema ps were then placed back into the casket and ag ia lowered into the grave. Returning to the city the physicians made an affidavit in which they say: "The body, in weight, approximated in our opinion about hity pounds. On examination of the head no signs of wounds or injuries were vissible. The skin was not broken. The ears and nose were intact. The skin and musc es of the face and neck

were gone. There were two openings be-tween the fourth and fifth intercestal spaces into the thoraric cavity. The skin and mus-cles on the anterior portion of the abdomen were intact to the creek of the illium or pelvic bones. The muscles and skin of the anterior and posterior of the thighs were en-tirely removed except the skin on the an-terior port on of the knee joints. The muscles and skin of the left leg were re-moved to within three inches of the ankle joint. On the right leg the skin and muscles were removed to within five inches of the ankle joint. Both feet were intact—the toes all present. There was no vestige of integ-rement or muscles on either arm, including the muscles of the shoulder blades to the wrist joints, except on the right foresten.
The flesh and muscles of both hands were intact."

Bailey, stripped him of his clothing and tarred him. His life was narrowly saved by Deputy Sheriff Stephen. 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

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
