WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 5, '84. I do not know the exact number of millions of dollars that "Boss" Shepherd is said to have expended in the improvements at the capital, but the fact is patent to every stranger that Washington is the finest city in the world. Think of tree, 1st. Turnips, 2nd. Rhubarb, 1st. Pop-corn, forty-eight miles of smooth concreted 2nd. Oyster plant, 1st. Horse-radish, 1st. Parsnips streets, shaded on either side by magnificent trees of the best varieties! The problem of municipal cleanliness, too, and the thoroughness with which they can be swept by the modern sweeping wagons. In the last ten years, then, we have seen that Washington has improved more than it had from the time of its foundation at the beginning of the century, and in the next decade, when the whole city shall have undergone the rejuvenating processes that Shepherd applied to the favored portions of it, the American citizen will possess a Capital that he may well be proud of. As to its sanitary condition, Washington has long been regarded as an unhealthy spot because of its malarial influences, but Congress has taken hold of the work of removing the cause of this complaint, in the filling up of the Potomac Flats, the dredging of the river, and widening the channel so as to secure an uninterrupted flow of the Potomac waters on the occasion of spring and summer floods. Beside this, the city is building the largest sewer in the world, a conduit more than four miles in length, and twentysix feet in diameter, stretching across the northern end of the city-large enough as you may well suppose for the most stupendous future that may be predieted for the capital.

It is announced that Mr. Cox, Chairman of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, has already matured a bill looking to the rehabilitation of the Ameri can navy by the immediate construction of twelve line of battle ships, as a commencement, to be followed yearly by the addition of smaller but equally effective vessels.
