vigilance effected nothing.

It was at first suspected that some person had obtained a duplicate key to Mr. Powning's postoffice drawer and was opening it sur-reptitiously. A close watch kept in the post-office lobby upset this theory, for nobody save Powning opened the box, though the letters continued to disappear. In the meantime a new lock was placed upon the drawer, and detective work was transferred to another phase of the case. For a fortnight the postoffice authorities have been on the watch without any result other than the embarrassment of overing that despite their surveillance the thefts continued without interruption. Though satisfied that the thefts really were taking place, all detective expedients have been equally ineffectual, until the postoffice authorities have settled down to the opinion that either there is no hope of cornering the rogue, or else that the thefts are from the out-

chief Clerk Boyd said his attention had been called by Mr. Powning to these alleged irregularities some time ago, and that he had carefully and persistently investigated every phase in the case, but as yet had been wholly unable to find the slightest evidence of crookedness upon the part of any man in the post-office employ. "I can only say this," said Mr. Boyd, "that the boxes now in use at the postoffice have been in service for so long as to have become almost worthless. For ten years they have been steadily in use, and we have found that many of them are continually getting out of order, and I think there is more than a bare possibility that these losses may be accounted for in this way. Many of these boxes have become so defective in their locks, etc., as to have given us trouble with other parties, but until this instance there has never been any reason to suspect any crookedness upon the inside of the office. We know that in some instances keys in use at the office have become so worn by long use as to now fit and unlock a half dozen drawers." The investigation will be pushed, and inspectors from Washington are expected.

THE NATION'S WARDS.

Estimates of Appropriations Required for Their Support.

The following are the estimates of the appropriations required for the support of the Indians the next fiscal year: Current expenses, salaries, etc., \$268,500, present appropriation, \$218,300; fulfilling treaties with and support of Indian tribes, \$3,194,355, present appropriation, \$2,574,419; general incidental expenses of the Indian service, \$184,600, present appropriation, \$141,800; trust funds \$95,170, supports)for the benefit of Indians not provided for by treaty), \$1,432,500, present appro-priation, \$1,201,500; miscellaneous \$693,200, present appropriation, \$518,000; Indian schools \$1,369,724, present appropriation \$989,600. Total estimated expenditure, \$7,28,049, present appropriation, \$5,738,789. The report of Inspector Haworth, in charge of Indian schools, shows an average attendance of pupils the last fiscal year of 3,919 at boarding and 1,759 at day schools; total attendance 5,678, or about 32 per cent larger than the preceding year, excluding all missionary schools and pupils placed in the state educational schools. The report shows that there are 40,000 Indian children old enough to attend school. At the Chiloca, I. T., school 7,000 aggress of land have been reserved for the benefit acres of land have been reserved for the benefit of pupils, so they may find homes immediately upon finishing their education. Two new schools are provided for in the estimates—one at Devil's Lake, Dak., and one at Wichite I.T.—and with the expected developments ta, I. T.—and with the expected developments and enlargements of schools, seven in opera-tion, it is believed that all applicants can be accommodated. The superintendent recom-mends that Indian pupils who may hereafter complete school terms, when of proper age, be admitted to the United States citizenship, and the same privilege be extended those Indians who have left their tribes and becom possessed of property. In this connection it is shown that the number of Indians who have thus quitted their tribes and became tax-payers rose from 25,731 in 1870, to 66,407 in 1880, an increase of 40,767 during ten years.

PRIVATE HENRY.

The Will Which He Made While in the Arctic Regions.

The will of the late Private Charles B. Henry, of the Greely expedition, who was shot for stealing provisions, was filed in the probate court at Chicago on the 3d. It is written in pencil on a scrap of paper about the size of a postal card, torn from a blank used in the navy. It is dated Camp Clay, May 9, 1884, and is as follows: "I, Charles B. Henry, being sound of mind and health, do hereby declare this to be my last will and test hereby declare this to be my last will and testament. All my property, pay due, and that may become due, I bequeath to my parents, brother and sisters, now alive, to be equally divided among them. Wm. Helms, of No. 20 South Water street, Chicago, I appoint as my executor. Charles B. Henry, private Fifth cavalry, United States army." The will is witnessed by Lieut. F. N. Kislingbury and Private J. Bender. A postal card to Mr. Helms tells of the condition of the command, saving seven had already died and the reaying seven had already died and the remainder expected death.

A New Electric Railroad.

The model of an electric elevated railroad, run by a new motor invented by Dr. W. F. Adams, of St. Louis, was put in order in the exposition building in that city. The power is distributed from a central station, and runs along a wire laid under the car track, similar to the cable of a cable road, and gripped in a beach; elegant little slippers for the similar manner by a wheeled grip which com municates the current to a revolving armature set between two magnates under the body of the car. The armature is on a sleeve, which revolves and communicates motion to

minor wheels curiously geared inside the track wheels, which then in turn revolve, check or re-revolve, being at the will of the conductor. The machine appears to be a suc-cess. The length of the model road is 250 feet, and the car makes a complete circuit ever twenty seconds. A full-sized car of twenty five horse power will shortly be set running in machinery hall, and this winter it is intended to have built and in operation an elevated street railroad, the franchise of which is ap-




