Each session, except special sessions shall not be less than sixty days. "Section 1.-The executive department shal consist of a Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruc-tion, Attorney General, Commissioner of Publie Lands and Buildings, and Board of Railway Commissioners. The officers named in this section shall each hold his office for the term of two years from the first Thursday after the first Thursday in January next after his election, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Provided, however, that the first election of said officers shall be held on the first Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November of 1886, and each succeeding election shall be held at the same relative time in each even year thereafter. All other officers that may be provided for by law, under the provisions of this section, shall be chosen in such manner and at such times, and shall hold their offices for such length of time as may be provided by law, and shall perform such duties and receive such compensation as may be provided by law. The Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of Public Lands and Buildings, and Attorney General, shall reside at the sear of government during their-terms of office and keep the public records, books and papers there, and the officers herein named shall per form such duties as may be required by law.

The ballots at the election at which said amendment shall be submitted shall be in the following form: "For proposed amendment to section one (1) of article five (5) of the constitution, entitled, 'Executive Department.' D. 1884.
