Patent That Will R elieve Horses of Much Dead Weight.

A new style of journal box, applied to one of the line pulleys which carry the cable of the Brooklyn bridge, has attracted the attention of passing mechanics of late, says the New York Times. It is situated near the New York entrance to the bridge, and has the virtue of not needing lubricating oils and at the same time not heating. For fortytwo days it has run continually, and it is pronounced a success by Col. Paine. The journal is a new anti-friction patent, and is based upon a system of bearing rollers supporting a journal and revolving about it in a smooth journal box. The axle is fitted closely in a sleeve, which revolves with it, and around this sleeve, rolling between it and the journal box, are twelve bearing rollers, also with journals, which revolve against short separating rollers, the only office of which is to prevent the bearing rollers from touching each oth-

er. The sleeve revolving with the axle presses against the inner surface of the ournal, and the journals of which bear against the separating rollers. The surfaces of these, in turn, roll around the bench and produce only rolling motion, without appreciable friction and therefore without heat.

The uses of the new journal are innumerable, and it can be modified so as to fit all machinery where journal bearings are used, and it is expected to revolutionize the department of mechanics. It is believed that a racing sulky or road wagon with these bearings would give a trotter the advantage of three or four seconds over a wagon of the same weight having greased axles.
