Board of county commissioners of Red Willow county met pursuant to adjournment of January 22d, 1885. Present, E. J. Allington, S. L. Green and Henry Crabtree, commissioners. C. D. Cramer, county clerk, and J. H. Goodrich, county treasurer. Proceedings of last session read and approved.

On motion, the clerk was instructed to order the necessary blanks for taking the census. ROAD DISTRICTS.—George E. Talbot and others petition for establishing public road:

Commencing at the southeast corner of section seven (7), town 3, north of range 39 west, running thence due north on section lines to the northeast corner of section seven (7), town 4, north of range 39 west, and terminating thereat.

On motion petition of George E. Talbot and others was granted, provided the county shall be at no expense for right of way, survey or other expense in establishment of said road.

On motion bond of James Hetherington, assessor Indianola precinct, was approved.

On motion bond of William H. Smith, overseer road district No. 21, was approved.

On motion bill of W. K. Lynch, transportation of pauper, was allowed on general fund 1884 and warrant drawn for \$1.50.

J. H. Everist, overseer road district No. 17, made annual settlement with board.

On motion board assessed lot 9, sec. 24, town 3, range 28, owned by A. A. Calkins, at \$40.

On motion board assessed the S. W. 1/4 of section 3, town 3, range 27, owned by H. C. Carver, at \$100.00.

On motion the clerk was instructed to enter said lands on the tax list for 1884.

The board having examined the books and accounts of J. H. Goodrich as county treasurer, a settlement was made with him on the basis of the following statement (see statement on fourth page).
