WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C., April 26, '85. The appointment of Edward J. Phelps, Esq., to the Court of St. James, though at first favorably received, is beginning to elicit some very unfavorable criticisms even from administration newspapers. It is shown that Mr. Phelps, though of late years a Democrat, has been conspicuous for his indifference to the success of his party, and one speech in his own state, (for which he afterwards apologized,) is the extent of his stump efforts in behalf of the principles he espoused after he had gone down in the wreck of the old Whig party.
