Weather Bureau

The following data, covering a period of 15 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Valentine, Nebr. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast for the weather conditions for the coming month.

NOVEMBER.

TEMPERATURE.

Mean or normal temperature 34°
The warmest month was that of 1899 with an average of 41°
The coldest month was that of 1896 with an average of 19°
The highest temperature was 78° on the 14, 1894.
The lowest temperature was 18° on the 29, 1896.

The earliest date on which first killing frost occurred in autumn, Sept. 12.
Average date on which first killing frost occurred in autumn, Sep. 18
Average date on which last killing frost occurred in spring, May 9
The latest date on which last killing frost occurred in spring, June 21.

PRECIPITATION (rain or melted snow)

Average for the month 0.62 inches
Average number of days with 0.1 of an inch or more, 4
The greatest monthly precipitation was 2.57 inches in 1896.
The least monthly precipitation was 0.04 inches in 1903.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hrs. was 1.55 inches on the 6, 1896.

The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours (record extending to winter of 1884-85 only) was 15.50 inch on the 25 26, 1896.
