He has recently returned from Washington, D.C. where he had been with a committee in the interest of stockmen of Western Nebraska in regard to the proposed inspection of cattle to prevent diseased stock going onto the market. He informs us that stockmen must have their herds dipped this spring in lime and sulphur in the ratio of one part lime to two of sulphur, and if stock shows clean at shipping station will be permitted to go onto the market. The stock inspectors will enforce these regulations. Mr. Comstock thinks this a fair compromise of the original order to permit no stock to be shipped from places where diseased stock existed.

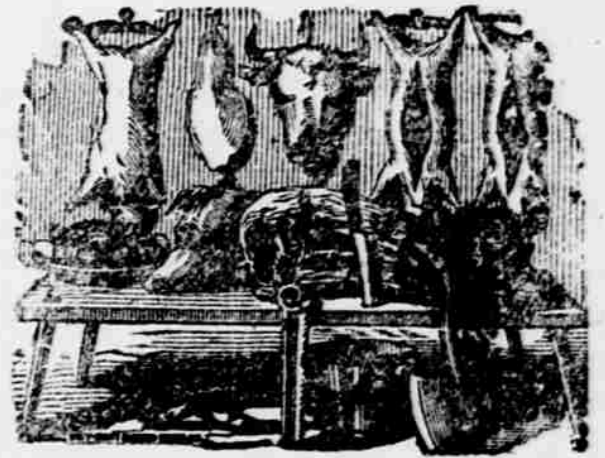
