Rev. J. W. Morgan preached in the Presbyterian church for the past two Sundays. His sermons were well written and exceedingly well delivered. The Presbyterians can do no better than to ask him to come to Valentine.

The U.S. Weather bureau report for the week ending July 12, shows extremes of temperature to have been 93° on the 12th, and 46° on the 9th, giving a range of 47°. The average daily mean was 66° and the normal 75°. showing a daily loss in temperature of 9°. The precipitation for the week was only .03 of an inch and the normal .61 of an inch, showing a loss of .58. The precipitation since the 1st of July is 2.05 inches and the total for the year to date is 20.82 inches. The winds have been slightly below the average, and the greatest velocity was 22 miles from NE on the 8th. All crops have been benefitted during the past week.

The weekly crop bulletin for the state of Nebraska shows the past week has been cold with about the normal rainfall. The mean daily temperature has averaged 9° below the normal. Light showers occurred nearly every day of the week, but the total rainfall was not large. The amount exceeded 1 inch in several counties but in 4 60 the greater portion of the state was slightly less than an inch. The 4 00 winter wheat harvest, although retarded some by showers, has on 4 00 the whole progressed nicely. A 4 00 little thrashing has been done in southeastern counties, the yield being good and the quality excellent. Spring wheat has improved somewhat in condition. Early oats are ripening and the harvest has begun in southeastern counties. The heads are well filled, but the stand thin and the straw short. Late oats promises a better crop. Considerable hay was damaged by rain. The wild or prairie hay crops will be heavy, especially in northern and eastern counties. Corn has grown fairly well and is healthy and in good conditon but needs higher temperature. Cultivation has been retarded by rain and a large part of the crop has not been laid by. The second crop of alfalfa is about ready to cut.


