CHARLES MONROE RUN OVER BY ENGIN AT FREMONT.

LONG IN EMPLOY OF ROAD

Both Feet Were Cut Off and His Head Was Crushed—Was Fireman on a Switch Engine in Fremont Yards. Leaves Widow and Three Children.

Fremont, Neb., Nov. 21.—Special to The News: Charles Monroe, fireman of the switch engine in the Chicago & Northwestern yards here, was killed this morning at 6 o'clock. He was run over by an engine. The locomotive ran over Mr. Monroe, cutting off both legs and crushing his head. He lived three hours and died at 9 o'clock. Monroe was an employe of long standing in the Northwestern service. He was forty-three years of age and is survived by a wife and three children.
