# IOWA FARMS BREAK ALL RECORDS

Produce \$330,495,421 During Year

Largest in History of State. Des Moines, Dec. 27 .- Iowa farmers this year raised a crop that is just \$121,230,887 better than the average crop of the last seventeen years. The total value of the products of the soil of Iowa this year was \$330,495,421, according to the annual report of Director John R. Sage, and the average value of the crops for the last seventeen years is \$209,264,534. This year's crop is an increase of over 33 1-3 per cent better than the aver-

Furthermore, the value of the crop this year is more than that of any other crop the state has ever raised, the next largest being the crop of total value was \$274,080,930.
