Nethaway's married sister, Mrs. Bellinger of Wahoo, and his two brothers, came to Norfolk Friday noon. The Nethaway funeral was said to depend on the arrival of the younger sister, Miss Lulu Nethaway.

Miss Lulu Nethaway, the sister of V. B. Nethaway to whom two letters were addressed by the brother before the tragedy, has been playing this season with the Klubers dramatic company. She has been on the stage

The Nethaway shooting was turned into murder at 6:40 a. m. Friday when Mrs. Nethaway died in the city hall, She lived about sixteen hours after her skull was shattered by the charge from her husband's shotgun. At no time did she regain consciousness, the nearest approach to consciousness coming fifteen or twenty minutes before her death.

Mrs. Nethaway following the shooting was taken to the city hall, turned into temporary hospital quarters. Drs. Bear and Pilger were called to the Ord, Neb., where they received the city hall, Dr. Pilger being in attendance the greater part of the time. Nurses were also secured. The wound was dressed in the early evening. At no time was death but a matter of a few hours.
