The criminal libel case against Editor George A. Miles of the O'Neill Independent was dismissed from the Holt county district court yesterday. The dismissal follows a retraction published by Editor Miles in the Independent, the dropping of the case being immediately suggested by Judge J. B. Barnes after Editor Miles had acknowledged his error in the article touching Judge Barnes which provoked the libel prosecution.

Yesterday County Attorney E. H. Whelan in the district court of Holt TUC CIDCMAN county filed a "nolle prosequi" and moved the court to strike the transcript from the files. 
