The center of wickedness in Norfolk falls under the jurisdiction of the county attorney because it lies just outside the present city limits. Last summer the county attorney started in to oust the ill-famed resorts from their present neighborhood and the managers promised to move.

During the progress of the Boche trial Senator Allen, Boche's attorney, delivered a scathing indictment against the Norfolk "row."
