END OF THE SULLY GANG

HOW CATTLE THIEVES WORKED IN EARLY DAYS.

SOCIETY BOUND BY DEATH

How a Woman's Wit Directed the Movements of the Old Time Sully Gang of Cattle Thieves on the Rosebud—DeMarsche Under Indictment.

Oacoma, S. D., April 25.—In the indictment of Joseph DeMarsche for cattle rustling and the action of Judge Carlund, of Sioux Falls, last week for the arrest of Sully, the gang of cattle thieves, the woman's wit played an important part.

"The Circle society," as this organization, dreaded by every stockman in Lyman, Meyer, Tripp, Gregory and Presko counties, was called, was the product of the brains of Mrs. Meyer Winter and her husband. Bound by all the rules of a black hand society, operating systematically, with a membership so secret that no man knew whether his neighbor was a thief or honest citizen, this organization for fifteen years terrorized this trans-Missouri country.

The Circle society held its monthly meetings at DeMarsche ranch on the Big White river, above the town of Westover. The officers of the society were: Meyer Winter, president; David Colombe, vice president; Mrs. Meyer Winter, treasurer, and Joe DeMarsche, secretary.

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descent was not a success. It appears that a young woman stenographer had been fearful of transportation facilities from the depot to the asylum and had telephoned to Superintendent James L. Greene that the party was coming. All unsuspecting Mr. McGorty, wearing an air of impregnable mystery, alighted from the 10:30 o'clock train and made a dash for the car which runs to the asylum door.

"Is this Mr. McGorty?" "It is," said the surprised legislator. "I am Dr. Greene of the asylum. I have carriages here to take the entire party out. Right this way, please."

Mr. McGorty and retinue gave up and silently rode out to the big institutions on the banks of the Kankakee river. Three other legislators came in one by one on later trains and the legislative inquiry proceeded upon regulation lines.

During the trip through one of the wards Representative McGorty and Hope thought they had stumbled upon a case of brutality when a quiet young man approached the party and respectfully asked:

"Are you gentlemen the members of the legislative investigation committee?" "Upon being answered in the affirmative he continued:

"I am from Chicago and am being cruelly treated here. I have been choked and beaten until I can stand it no longer."

"Who has beaten you?" Inquired Representative Hope.

The members of the committee began taking the patient's name in order to inquire into the case further when the young man said:

"That is not all of their cruelty. They are trying to poison me by sterilizing my food. I am the man who dug the Pacific ocean with an oyster fork, and they are jealous," said the patient, and the legislators tore up their notes and passed on.

Monthly assessments were paid by each member into the treasury and the funds so raised were used in defending any member of the organization who might be arrested for stealing cattle or horses.

Chairman Hill placed Superintendent Greene upon the witness stand during the afternoon. Dr. Greene said that he had come from the state asylum at Lincoln, Neb., and that he sought the position at Kankakee because he was ambitious to take charge of a large institution.

"I lost money by coming here," said Dr. Greene. "I received a salary of \$2,500. At Lincoln I had a private practice worth \$5,000 a year, and received \$1,000 as advisor of the lunacy commission. When I asked Governor Deen about the appointment he told me to see the trustees of the Kankakee asylum, and that I would have to have the personal recommendation of Dr. Frank Billings of Chicago before I could get the place."

Upon being asked about the visits of asylum trustees, he said that Dr. Hirsch had visited the institution, but had never stayed all night, and that Dr. Billings had not been there in two years.

Woman Burned in Prairie Fire. Sisseton, S. D., April 25.—Word was brought to this city last evening of the burning to death in a prairie fire of Mrs. Freeman, wife of a farmer,

near old Fort Sisseton last Sunday. There is also an unconfirmed report of the burning to death of another woman and a child. The fire was so close to the city that it was found necessary to send out fifty men to fight them. Thousands of dollars worth of property has been destroyed. The hill country was a panorama of flames.

He Tried High Finance. Recent reform waves having rounded "high finance" unpopular an ill timed flight in the aforesaid finance brought grief and a night in the city jail to W. F. Sporn.

Mr. Sporn was arrested on complaint of E. J. Schorregg, who charged him with obtaining money under false pretenses. Sporn went into Schorregg's store after banking hours. He drew a check for \$5 on the Norfolk National bank and had Mr. Schorregg cash it. Mr. Sporn had not had an account in the Norfolk National for over a year.

He was arrested and spent the night in the city jail. In the morning he was brought before Justice Lambert. His fine was placed at \$10, which with the \$5 restoration and the costs made the high finance junket cost about \$20.

Three similar complaints had previously been made against Sporn. He has, according to information given the county attorney, drawn worthless checks on both of the other Norfolk banks.

Winside Wars Over Fence. Winside, Neb., April 25.—Five times has a representative of the town government tore down a fence and opened up a street in the suburbs of the town and five times has an adjacent property owner repaired the fence and shut up the street. Thus it has been this week and seems likely to continue.

A long and hard fought battle in the courts seems inevitable as neither side is disposed to yield an inch and the acre of ground in controversy now valued at \$100 will undoubtedly prove very expensive to the victor when possession is finally rewarded.

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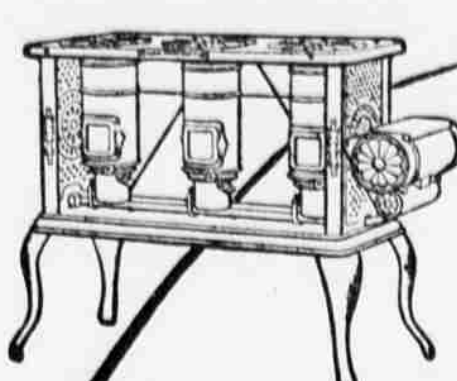
