WALTHILL RED MEN BEAT NORFOLK FRIDAY 6 TO 2.

GAME A TIE TILL THE SEVENTH

Norfolk Was Weak in the Box But Played Great Game Against the Fast Indians—Walthill Scored on Norfolk Errors.

Walthill Indians of Norfolk 2. Weakness in the pitching end of the battery and errors at critical moments brought defeat to the Norfolk nine Friday afternoon at the local diamond. The Walthill Indians, who yesterday beat Plainview 10 to 1, played in winning style, taking advantage of errors to turn them into scores.

Up to the seventh inning Norfolk kept the game a tie, 2 to 2. Two runs in the seventh and two more in the ninth clinched the game for the red men.

Norfolk was at sea for a pitcher up to a short time before the game. Bovee was out of the game with a stiff arm and a call for a pitcher from a fast west Nebraska nine had been cancelled when the sky indicated rain about 10 o'clock. As a result Engen, a ball player who claimed to have pitched for Gregory last year, was put in the box. His work did not meet with the approval of the fans.

Norfolk will meet no faster teams this year than the Walthill Indians. The Indians play the fastest kind of ball. Seven of them are real red men. Two, Fiscus and Boughn, are white.
