NORFOLK JAIL HIS HOME

HARRY ROHER, SOBER AND INDUSTRIOUS, CALLS JAIL HOME.

HAS LIVED IN JAIL TWO MONTHS

Harry Roher, Never in Jail Before, Has Turned Norfolk's Bastille Into "Home"—Dropped in And Made Himself Indispensable.

How many "gentle robbers" have ever spent a night in jail? How many shudder at the iron bars? How many would willingly return to the "black of an iron street door" which is opened only at night in the city morgue?

There is a man in Norfolk, a young man of twenty-five, who makes his home in the Norfolk jail. He is a steady, industrious and hard working man. He has been in Norfolk for two months and there is no place in the city that he can call his home but the city jail.

At day break the jail doors swing open and Harry Roher for such is his name, is up on his feet, ready to work. He finds work from different people all over the city. The people who hire him say he is a good worker, one of the kind who doesn't shirk the odds and ends. So when there is work to be done he goes. Then at night he comes back. The jail doors open and close. He is locked in with the prisoners.

Harry Roher has proved that it takes more than iron bars and a steel cage to make a prison. With a clear conscience he leaves nothing in the jail but a home, a place of shelter, a friendly bed.

The story of this young man, whose home is the city jail, is a story of the business depression that was noted several months ago in the larger cities. He worked as a wood molder in St. Louis. Then work stopped. He started north. Other fell found him one night in the railroad yards. Just to hold him over night, fell brought Roher to the jail. The next morning the young man said that he would go out and look for work. He did and at night returned and asked if he couldn't stay all night in the jail. He got permission.

After that Roher fitted naturally into the jail. He accepted it as his home and without any "declarations of intention" set about to straighten out the place up. He has just about made himself indispensable around the jail. He looks it. He accepts the odds of life with prisoners. So without any one admitting that it is so, the new situation has come to be accepted.

Roher has had two cases of jail fever. One in the "bird" part in jail. Today doesn't give a damn. "The other day Roher had a woman, who wanted to hire him, at work in the yard ask, "Have you seen that young bunk?" He had never been called a bunk before. That was the second case of jail fever.

"No, I was never arrested until Other fell took me up that night because I looked like a tramp," Roher says.

A GALLERY DEMONSTRATION.

But It Was An Outburst of Real Enthusiasm.

"The Roosevelt demonstration in the republican national convention Thursday afternoon came from the galleries, but it was an outburst of genuine and sincere enthusiasm. This is the verdict of County Assessor Jack Koenigsberg, who returned from Chicago yesterday. He and Burr Mapes went out and got a lunch during the demonstration and when they came back the crowds were still cheering.

Among those who attended from Norfolk were: Burr Mapes, Jack Koenigsberg, M. D. Tyler and Paul Zuehlke. At Chicago Jack Koenigsberg was joined by his brother, William, who formerly lived here.

Burr Mapes and W. N. Huse returned Saturday noon from Chicago. Commenting on the decision of the South Dakota supreme court to the effect that Fairfax is only the temporary location of the Gregory county seat the Gregory Advocate says: "It will be remembered that all fall and winter the towns of Burke and Herriek spent a great deal of time and money to secure names to their respective petitions. In the early part of the fight, Herriek maintained that Fairfax was but the temporary county seat and that no petition was necessary, while Burke maintained that Fairfax was the permanent county seat and that a petition was necessary to remove it from Fairfax. When the matter was presented to the commissioners, Herriek having a much larger petition than Burke, claimed that Fairfax was the permanent location and Burke claimed that it was only temporary. The commissioners spent a long time examining the two petitions and finally decided that Herriek should be the candidate for county seat honors. But this decision handed down by the supreme court gives every town in the county an opportunity to enter the race for county seat. A majority vote is necessary to move the county seat from Fairfax."
