ASSESSORS' RETURNS REVISED BY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

SOME ARE RAISED, SOME CUT

After Revising Individual Schedules The County Board of Equalization Equalized Precinct Ratings—County Board Allows Bills.

Madison, Neb., June 18, 1908, at 1 p. m.—Board of equalization met pursuant to adjournment. Present Commissioners John Malone, Henry Sunderman and Burr Taft, County Assessor P. W. Ruth and County Clerk, Geo. E. Richardson.

Minutes of June 9-10-11 and 12, 1908, were read and approved. Matter of personal assessment of Diers brothers in Madison, Neb., taken up. Mr. Fred Diers was sworn and gave testimony on behalf of the county. On motion made and seconded the assessment of Diers Brothers in Madison, Neb., on the item of merchandise was raised from \$13500.00 to \$18000.00. Taft voted Yes, Sunderman voted Yes, P. W. Ruth, yes, Geo. E. Richardson, yes, John Malone, no. Carried.

Matter of assessment of Avery, Elchoff & Thompson of Tilden, Neb., was taken up. W. H. Avery was sworn and examined on behalf of the county. On motion made and seconded that assessment of Avery, Elchoff & Thompson on item of merchandise in Tilden village, Neb., be raised from \$4000.00 to \$6000.00. Taft voted yes, Sunderman yes, Ruth yes, Richardson yes, John Malone yes. Carried.

Matter of assessment of L. B. Baker on personal property in Battle Creek village, came up for hearing. L. B. Baker was sworn and examined in behalf of the county. On motion the board adjourned to 7:30 p. m.

There being no further complaints before the board on motion the matter of equalization was declared closed with the understanding that by agreement with E. E. Gillette the county assessor shall add to the assessment of the Edwards & Bradford Lumber Co., item of notes and book accounts due yard at Norfolk, Neb., to be furnished by Mr. Gillette, and the board adjourned subject to the call of the county clerk, pending the report from the state board, for the purpose of making levees.

NORFOLK DEFEATS NEWMAN GROVE AT TILDEN REUNION.

CONGRESSMAN J. F. BOYD SPOKE

Third Day of Reunion Marked by Increased Attendance—E. A. Bullock Was Missed by Tilden Audience. Light Shower Friday.

Tilden, Neb., June 27.—Special to The News: Norfolk won base ball honors yesterday in the ball tournament held in connection with the old soldiers' reunion, defeating Newman Grove 9 to 1.

Congressman Boyd made the Principal address of the afternoon. The third day of the reunion was marked by a much larger attendance than either of the preceding days. The crowd was considerably augmented by delegations from Norfolk and Battle Creek.

Missed E. A. Bullock. The assembled multitude had expected to be regaled with one of E. A. Bullock's inimitable lectures of wit and wisdom, but at the last moment Mr. Bullock backed out of his contract with the grace of a soldier who "skeddaddles" from the firing line.

Congressman Boyd spoke. Congressman Boyd was the principal speaker and entertained a tent full of people for about forty minutes.

The Norfolk and Newman Grove base ball teams played a faultless and highly exciting game up to the end of the sixth inning, when not a run had been scored. Just as the delighted spectators were beginning to feel confident that they were to be treated to a record game, Newman Grove players shot up in the air and let in four runs. The game ended 9 to 1 in favor of Norfolk.

The fielding of Norfolk was clean, only one error being chalked up against the locals. The "Kids" had their batting eyes with them, also, landing on the ball for ten safe swats. Everybody took a crack at the ball, Kirkland securing two hits.

Monday afternoon the "Kids" journey to Plainview to meet the Sterlings. Bovee will do the "rotating" for Norfolk and Kirkland will be saved for the big game with Humphrey at Madison on the Fourth. This game is for a \$100 purse. The "Kids" are improving with each game and Capt. Shafer is confident that they will round into championship form before the end of the season.

ATKINSON MAN MURDERED. Ray Parnell of Atkinson is Killed Near Lusk, Wyo.

O'Neill Frontier: Ray Parnell, against whom a case stood in this county alleging complicity in the Ferguson ranch raid near Atkinson, was shot and killed near Lusk, Wyo., Wednesday. The exact particulars of the

affair are hard to get, but it looks like it was a case of cold blooded murder. Ray started for a ranch near Lusk with two companions horseback. The next sign of him he was found dead by the roadside, a bullet hole in his head. The remains were brought to Atkinson for burial. The same day he was killed, William Wellar charged with complicity in the Atkinson affair, entered a plea of guilty and was given a term of one year in the penitentiary.
