New York, Aug. 6.- Severe elecrical storms, accompanied by heavy tain and in some Listances by damaging showers of bail, broke the heat wave that has been afflicting. New York state and the New England states. The storm brought great relief to this city, for during the day ten deaths and more than twenty prostrations were caused by the heat and excessive humidity. Even early in the day the hospitals were caring for many prostrated.

From all sections of New England and New York came reports of damage done by the storm. At Green Island, near Troy, N. Y., Mrs. Thomas McCabe was killed by lightning.

At Jamestown, N. Y., the storm was especially severe, driving several craft ashore on the lake. Four Rhode Island churches were struck by light-

Among those killed by the heat in this city was the Rev. Edward Wallace-Neil, pastor of the Protestant Episcopal church of St. Edward the Martyr. He was overcome just after he had officiated at the morning service and died within a few minutes.

Three Deaths at Chicago.

Chicago, Aug. 6.-Three more peo ple died as the result of heat prostrations here. At 1 p. m. a shift in the wind sent the humidity mark gown and halted an increase in the heat wave. The ill effects of the previous days were still apparent in the tenement districts, in which sections the mortality among infants has become abnormally high. Because of the increased use of water on parks and private lawns, the water supply in some sections has dwindled.
