

ON STAGE LAST NIGHT SHE RECALLED TRAGEDY

ACTRESS PLAYS IN TOWN OF BROTHER'S DUAL SHOOTING.

Very different indeed were the circumstances of the arrival of Miss Lulu Nethaway, a Norfolk actress and a member of "The Girl and the Hawk" company, in Norfolk Sunday from the coming of Miss Nethaway to Norfolk last December in response to a message telling of the terrible Nethaway tragedy enacted on December 5, 1907, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon in a Union Pacific coach.

Even this last visit to Norfolk was not lacking in reminiscences of the tragedy for a hundred things suggested to the actress that home coming of nearly a year ago.

Actress His Favorite Sister.

Lulu Nethaway was the favorite sister of V. B. Nethaway, the crack trap-shooter, who with the unerring aim of an expert gun man shot his wife a coach length away from him on a Union Pacific train while panic stricken passengers huddled under seats or found dangerous exits through the car windows.

Story Called to Mind.

The appearance of Miss Nethaway at the Auditorium must revive the details of the year-old tragedy in the minds of Norfolk people just as the sight of Norfolk forced back the painful memories upon Miss Nethaway.

Valle Nethaway had murder in his mind. He had sat in the district court room at Madison, revolver in hand, waiting for his wife's divorce case to be called for trial. It went over until the evening of December 6. On the morning of that day Nethaway wrote three death messages, one to his daughter, Sophia Nethaway, and two to his youngest sister, Lulu Nethaway, the actress. He addressed these letters and then went to the depot with a shotgun. His appearance with a gun created no comment but when he stepped onto the moving train, still in the business center of the city, his wife read in an instant her doom. Nethaway wrote in blood and powder as dramatic and tragic a story as his sister can ever act.

He warned the passengers. He raised the shotgun. True as ever to his command the gun poured its load of shot directly into the wife's head, a car length away. A second shot was directed at Mrs. Fred Harder, his wife's companion, but Mrs. Harder was down behind a seat and though her hat was shot away most of the shot buried itself into the coach seat. Nethaway then jumped from the train and went directly to the Salter grain office. He covered C. B. Salter and J. W. Gibson with a revolver which he also used to keep the crowd outside at bay. Over the telephone he called up his mother, Mrs. E. Nethaway, and told her both of the murder which was passed and of the suicide to come. He asked for kind treatment for his daughter. Then he started to turn the gun on himself. "Don't kill yourself in my office," Clarence Salter remonstrated. "I'm a gentleman and I'll kill myself where ever you want me to," said Nethaway and he went out and ended his own life in the grain elevator nearby. Mrs. Nethaway lived sixteen hours. Husband and wife were buried the following Sunday, which was December 8. It had been Nethaway's intention to kill Senator Allen of Madison, his wife's attorney, whom he blamed for the demand for alimony.

Miss Nethaway at Stromsburg.

Miss Nethaway was playing at Stromsburg when the news reached her. As best she could she filled the Thursday night engagement and then hurried to Norfolk. A twenty-five mile drive took her to David City where she caught a train to Columbus. Miss Nethaway boarded the Union Pacific accommodation train at Columbus and was suddenly shocked to find herself in the very coach in which the tragedy had been enacted. Blood stains were still on the chairs and bullet marks marred the far end of the car. In the coach some of the travelers were making half frightened, half joking remarks about the coach and the tragedy but they stopped when they grasped Miss Nethaway's identity. On the train was a theatrical troupe, the "Lost in New York" company, and the members did what they could to lighten the journey made in the coach so recently the scene of the events which were calling their companion actress to Norfolk.

Miss Nethaway played in Stromsburg again last week and again thoughts of last December were in her mind.

This is Miss Nethaway's first appearance on a Norfolk stage. She has visited north Nebraska towns before but has not been before a Norfolk audience. This time her appearance here was quite by chance as the company was booked for Norfolk before Miss Nethaway had joined the company at the season's opening.

Her Fifth Year.

This is Miss Nethaway's fifth year as an actress. She first went on the road as a governess for three little boys, juvenile actors with the Peterson company which once showed in Norfolk a good many years ago. Before this in the years 1898-1900 Miss Nethaway had been at Bellevue college and at the state university, a year at each school.

Before going on the stage Miss Nethaway was engaged for a time as a governess on the O. B. Manville ranch near Onkdale.

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"R. F. D." For the Rosebud. Gregory county, South Dakota, is to have an organized rural free delivery system, a United States postal inspector being in Gregory county at this time for the purpose of organizing from twenty-five to thirty routes.

W. H. Locke as "The Hawk" came up to the standard forecasted in the press notices given him previous to his arrival in Norfolk. He played with force and evident originality. The character of "The Girl" was no less pleasingly set forth by Miss Della Locke, who won favor through her perfect naturalness and ease of manner.

Miss Lulu Nethaway, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Nethaway living on South Third street, played the role of the widow showing a considerable degree of talent.

The director's gown made its first bow to a Norfolk public with "The Girl and the Hawk" last evening. Backed by stage settings the gown appeared quite modest.

SENATOR RANDALL HAS 265 MAJORITY

COMPLETE RETURNS GIVE RANDALL 1,338, APPLEBY 1,073.

OFFICIAL CANVASS IS MADE

Official Canvass of Primary Votes Show that Senator Randall Carried Madison, Pierce and Wayne Counties, Appleby Stanton County.

C. A. Randall of Newman Grove has been renominated by the Republicans of the Eleventh senatorial district by a majority of 265 over R. Y. Appleby of Stanton. This is based on the official canvass of the returns made yesterday and announced last night.

Mr. Appleby carried Stanton, his home county, by 231 majority. Mr. Randall carried Madison, his home county, by 162 majority. Pierce county was carried by Randall by 139 votes and Wayne county by 195.

It is interesting to note that Appleby received 74 votes in Stanton Randall's home precinct, while Randall received only 19 votes in Appleby's home precinct and only 84 votes in the whole of Stanton county. It is said that there was not a Randall man in Stanton county who did not go to the polls.

Shallenberger, Williams, Barton and Bishop Have Won. Returns from the primary election, coming in faster since the Friday canvass, still point to the nomination of Shallenberger for governor on the Democratic ticket and of Williams for railway commissioner, Bishop for state superintendent and Barton for state auditor on the Republican ticket. It is possible that Shively for land commissioner may have been defeated by Cowles.

COSTS A DOLLAR A VOTE

Pierce Election Officers Condemn Law in Present Form. Pierce, Neb., Sept. 7.—Special to The News: The second annual test of the primary law in Pierce county develops the fact that members of the election boards are practically unanimous in condemning the law in its present form. Returns and bills for expenses show that there were 801 votes cast in the county with \$769.37 in bills already filed and enough yet to come in to make the vote cost about \$1 each. It is claimed that many voters remain away from the polls rather than disclose their politics. Another feature that could be remedied would be to provide for an earlier time of canvassing the vote. The returns were all in Pierce county Wednesday morning and no definite information obtainable until Saturday.

TO BEAUTIFY THE LOCAL SCHOOL YARDS

FAVOR MAPPING OUT TEN YEAR IMPROVEMENT PLAN.

ANOTHER TEACHER IS ADDED

The School Board to Meet Crowded Conditions at Washington School Engaged Miss Harriet Mather. Gravel Grounds at High School.

A systematic plan to make practical children's parks of the Norfolk school yards and to rescue the several "school grounds" of the city from their present barren and rather unkempt condition is advocated by Superintendent F. M. Hunter and favored by members of the Norfolk school board. The beautifying of the school yards was one of the questions raised by the new superintendent at the meeting of the board of education last night.

Mr. Hunter urges the adoption of a systematic plan for an improvement policy to cover a period of ten or more years and providing that certain definite things should be done each year. One of the first things which Mr. Hunter favors being done at once is the grading of the different playgrounds where there are low places which should be filled up or uneven stretches which need the leveling process. He would like to see at once a basket ball court in every school yard.

The high school grounds will probably be the first to secure the services of the working crew. The new lots recently added to the high school grounds on the east are to be leveled and covered with gravel.

Add to Teaching Force. Another teacher was added to the force at the Washington school at last night's meeting, Miss Harriet Mather of Norfolk being chosen. She will probably be given the second and part of the third grade at the Washington school.

Lights were ordered placed in the assembly room at the high school to make the room available for evening entertainments or receptions which may be given.

The full membership of the board was present at the meeting.
