Many and elaborate are the prepara. real circulation. tions now in progress to fittingly celebrate Lincoln's centenary. All over the United States the public school children are studying his life, his work and his character and learning lessons of patriotism and reverence from it. If a country is known by the way in which it honors its great men, surely America should stand well up in the list.

The centenaries of four great men occur in this month-Mendelssohn, Bartholdy, Darwin and Lincoln, the last two on the same day. Poe's occurred in January, Chopin and Edward Fitzgerald come in march, Tennyson in August and Gladstone in December. Let us hope that the year 1909 will give to the world as many pre-eminently great and good men as began their earthly career in 1809.

One reform is to take place in inauguration ceremonies when Mr. Taft takes the oath of office, March 4th, which will be approved by all. Instead of baving every band in the inaugural procession play that time worn and unpopular tune, "Hail to the Chief," as they pass the president's stand, only the first band will play it while other bands, as they pass, will choose more popular music.
