To Balloon Across the Atlantic. Boston, Mass., May 10.-A balloon trip over the Atlantic from Boston to Europe is planned by Professor Henry Clayton, whe recently resigned as servatory after sixteen years of study of the direction and velocity of wind currents. Professor Clayton believes he can accomplish the feat of crossing the Atlantic by taking advantage of an upper air, or planetary current, which, his experiments have shown, flow constantly eastward at the height of two miles or more above the earth.

He declares he can cover the distance of 3,000 miles easily in three or four days.

As a sort of preliminary test of the possibilities of the trip, Professor Clayton is now making plans for an air voyage from San Francisco to the Atlantic coast.
