Ordinance No. 341.
An ordinance vacating an alley fourteen and one-half feet wide, extending north and south between lot 13 and lots 14, 15 and 16, in block 1 of Bear's addition to Norfolk, Nebraska.
Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of Norfolk, Nebraska:

Section 1. That the alley extending north and south between lot 13 and lots 14, 15 and 16, in Bear's addition to Norfolk, Nebraska, be vacated in accordance with the petition of the majority of the owners of real estate abutting upon said alley, filed with the city clerk, and that said alley is hereby declared annulled and vacated, and the land embraced within said alley revert to the adjacent owners, and the mayor and city clerk are hereby ordered to execute and deliver to John Krantz and George Stolcop in the name and in behalf of the city of Norfolk a quit claim deed for said portion of ground, conveying and releasing the easement of the city to said land originally included in said alley, for the consideration of seventy-five dollars.

Sec. 2. That this ordinance to be in force and to take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.
Passed and approved this 8th day of September, 1909.
