FRANK PULSHA, BOHEMIAN 60 YEARS OLD, HAD DIED.

EVIDENCE OF DEATH STRUGGLE

The Man Had Dug a Hole Three Inches Deep in the Ground With His Finger Nails-No Thought of Foul Play in the Case, However.

Gregory, S. D., Feb. 3.-Frank Pulsha, a Bohemian about 60 years of age was found dead beside the road about a quarter of a mile north of the city limits.
