BIG FAMILIES OF CHILDREN ARE A DISGRACE, SHE SAYS.

T. R., POOR, IGNORANT MAN'

Mrs. Larein Helen Baker of Spokane Goes Down to Washington With Some Ideas of Her Own—"Only 10 NELIGH GETS Percent of Children are Wanted."

Washington, April 14.- "Ten years hence to be father of ten or twelve hildren will be as much of a disgrace as being a confirmed drunkard is at present," last night declared Mrs. Larein Helen Baker of Spokane Wash., a suffragette who will be heard along original lines of thought at the convention of the national women's suffrage association which opens in this city today.

Her studies of children all over the world, she says, had convinced her that "not more than 10 percent of them were children of love and that the other 90 percent were not wanted." "Roosevelt, poor, ignorant man." she continued, "urges large families but, I tell you, it is quality we want in children and not quantity.
