LONDON POLICE AROUSED OVER AMERICAN MURDER.

Great Britain Has Not Been Stirr Much in Years by a Murder, as This Slaying of the Popular Amer ican Vaudeville Artist.

London, July 15 .- The first story of what may have been the actual committing of the crime was told by in the next few days will be watched neighbors of Dr. Hawley Crippen, in by the New York police. the cellar of whose home was unearthed the body believed by the police to be that of the physician's wife, who was known on the stage as Belle

Elmore. Since the discovery of the body and the disappearance of Dr. Crippen and his typist, Miss Ethel Clara Leneve. the Scotland Yard detectives have inquired dillecatly among those living in the vicinity of the Crippen home for diers if necessary in extermination of some information that would throw light on the domestic habits and relations of the American doctor and his netress wife.

Heard Woman's Screams.

Nothing was learned until today, when the proprietress of a small shop at the rear of the Crippen residence told of hearing a woman's screams and pleas for mercy arising seemingly from the cellar in which the burned and mutilated corpse was found. Mrs Crippen disappeared in February last. It was four or five months ago when the screams were heard, the woman said. Her shop overlooks the little garden back of the Crippen home. To the police the shopkeeper said:

"I had often heard revolver practice in the garden. One night about four or five months ago, I cannot place the time exactly, I was awakened by a woman's cries. It was midnight. The screams appeared to come from Dr Crippen's house. I listened and heard a woman's voice pleading:

"Don't, Oh Don't." "Don't, Oh don't,"

"To me it seemed that the cries were from a woman in the basement of the house occupied by Dr. and Mrs. Crippen. As nothing developed further I soon forgot the occurrence and did not recall it until I learned of the tragedy discovery.'

London, July 15 .- While the police authorities were exhausting their resources today to lay hands on Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, the American, and his woman typeist, physicians were examining the mutilated body of his wife with a view to determining the man ner in which the murder was done.

The finding in the cellar of a re volver gave weight to the report that the vaudeville artist had been shot before the body was battered into an unrecognizable mass and buried in the building the bridge, are having some cellar of the Crippen home at Hilldrop Crescent, North London.

It also was reported that traces of poison had been found by the doctors. The latter will present their theories as to the cause of death at an inquest to be held tomorrow.

Causes Stir in London. It has been a long time since a murder case in London has attracted such attention. The fact that the murdered woman was an American, as is the husband, who is charged with the crime, has spurred the police to unusual activity. The full force of Scotland Yard, under the personal direction of Superintendent Forest are making a thorough search for the fugitive doctor and Miss Ethel Clara Leneve.

MISTREAT AMERICAN PRISONER

Pittman Found in Filthy Cell, Starving to Death in Nicaragua.

Washington, July 15 .- Confined in a filthy cell, 6x5 feet, unfed save by strangers, William Pittman, an American captured by Madriz' forces iear Bluefields, was found in an overcrowded local prison at Managua by Consul Olivaries.

The consul, who is stationed at that oint, telegraphed the state departered the revolting conditions and brough protests forced Dr. Madriz to urnish the adventurous American beter prison accommodations. Pittman, whose relatives live at Cambridge, Mass, told the consul that he left Freytown, July 4, that since then his captors have failed to provide him with food, leaving him dependent for subsistence on charity. Pittman was thrying.

The consul reported that no deflifte action regarding Pittman had been determined by the authorities and he, Olivaries, will exert every effort to insure fairness and human reatment for Pittman.

When the United States originally earned of Pittman's arrest, Dr. Madriz assurred Olivaries that the prisoner would be treated fairly and considerately. Constant complaint from American citizens at Matagalpa, relative to the threats made against their lives and property by agents of the Madriz government, are being received by United States consular representatives. Consul Olivaries cabled to the state department that anti-American feeling in the western part of Nicaragua, the section under control of the Madriz faction, is growing more bitter.

Mr. Olivaries has made vigorous rep resentations to Dr. Madriz and reiterated to him Secretary Knox's warnng that this government will hold the Madriz faction strictly accountable for the security of American life and prop-
