Cliff Williams Uses Revolver. Clifford Williams, a local plumber

The shooting took place on the porch of the home after Williams had called Johns to the door and informed him that he was about to put him

A few months ago the stepmother remarried and Clifford has been taking on affinities as fast as they appeared. On two occasions he was taken in by the police for being in company with women whose husbands were away from the city. 
