WILLIAMS BOUND OVER

Man Who Used Revolver On Leslie Johns Taken to Jail.
 Clifford Williams, who was arrested on charges filed by Leslie Johns for trying to kill Johns with a 38-caliber revolver, was bound over to the district court by Judge Eiseley last evening. Williams denied having been at the Johns home at the time of the shooting. Both Mr. and Mrs. Johns appeared against him in court. His bonds were fixed at \$200 but he was unable to produce this amount and was taken to the county jail by Constable Pinkhouse.

Mrs. Johns declared both she and her sister were in the front room when Williams came on the porch and asked Johns to step out. They both heard the shot immediately afterward.

Before leaving Norfolk for the county jail a woman came to visit him. She brought him a change of clothing and took away an old suit of clothes Williams wore when he was arrested. Mrs. Johns' sister, with whom police say Williams was infatuated, did not appear in court.

WHAT BECAME OF HIM?

Telegraph Operator Who Was in Police Court Here, Has Disappeared.

What has become of E. J. Riordan, the telegraph operator whom the police asked to leave the city? Authorities at Freeport, Ill., where the operator's wife and babies are living, have asked the Norfolk police to give them information of the man. Riordan's wife wrote him while he was telegrapher at St. Charles, S. D., during the Rosebud land rush, that she was in need of money and that the babies needed shoes because of the cold weather. The rush was over Riordan was paid off and given a ticket to Freeport. He landed in Norfolk fully intoxicated and was taken in by the police.

He declared he had plenty of money before he became drunk. The police found him lying unconscious in an obscure part of the city. A day later he was again taken in and fined in Judge Eiseley's court. He then was given a deed to some property and a ticket to Freeport, Ill., which were found on his person. He said it was his first offense and that he was anxious to get back to his wife and children. Nothing has been heard of him at Freeport since he left St. Charles.

FIRST RANK SHOW IS HERE TONIGHT

BRADY'S PRODUCTION OF HILARIOUS COMEDY, "BABY MINE," AT AUDITORIUM.
