Harry Earl, a Negro, Charged with Killing of Charles Viall, Fremont, Neb., Nov. 28.—With Harry Earl, a negro, alleged slayer of Charles Viall, on trial on a charge of murder in the first degree, the November term of district court was opened by Judge Thomas of Columbus.

DRESDEN CHINA.

Its Three Periods and the Marks the Pieces Bear.

Dresden china began its reign at the fair of Leipzig, 1721, where it was offered for public sale for the first time. It has had three periods—King's, Marcelline and modern.

The factory marks traced on the bottom of each piece vary according to the period—the oldest (King's) being the monogram A. R. and the wand of Aesculapius.

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
