

He also reported that there are outstanding warrants to the amount of \$72,098, of which \$67,348 is bearing interest at 7 per cent. The report was dated Détober 19. Comptroller Westberg also submitted a report of the entire city finances, which showed that on September 30 the school fund amounted

to \$16.241. A communication was received from Theoore Heuck, Shane and Jackson and the Paxton & Vierling Iron works, making com-plaints that Holbrook & Kane, contractors for putting in heating apparatus in various schools, had failed to pay them a balance of \$225 for material and taber on the ground that they were unable to make a settlement with the city.
