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ARTICLE XIV. CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

Citizenship Rights Not to Be Abridged.

1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

The Monitor sees nothing in the alleged seven "specific amenaments secured by the council and Congressman Madden" which cannot be as successfully evaded as the original provisions of the bill. Under it, carriers were forbidden to discriminate against interstate passengers and were ordered to provide "equal accommodations for all passengers." These explicit and mandatory provisions have been ignored with impunity, and under private ownership and government ownership as well nothing was done about these glaring violations of law.
