## ARTICLE XIV. CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES. Citizenship Rights Not to Be Abridged.

1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States. and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

> MAN FAINTS WHEN SENTENCED BY JUDGE

> Found Guilty of Opening Another Man's Mail, Jesse Nash Given Twenty-five seconds in Peniten-

(By Associated Press.) Chicago, Ill., May 6 .- Federal Judge Landis sitting in the United States district court sentenced Jesse Nash, a colored man, to the penitentiary for twenty-five seconds, for receiving and opening another man's mail. Nash fainted when the sentence was announced and there was a general commotion in the court room. The prisoner and the on-lookers had understood the judge to say twenty-five years instead of seconds. Nash, according to the testimony, had suspected his wife of writing love letters to another man. He went to the postofifce general delivery and asked for the man's mail. He was given a letter in his wife's handwriting. The other man, E. A. Ahern, had Nash arrested for steal-
