The Daily Herald of Albany, Ga., is authority for the above reason for the brutal lynching which shocked Mitchell and Decatur counties. Roland and Harvel were part of a

group standing in front of a county store when Harvel ordered the colored man to dance for the amusement of himself and friends. Roland took the white man's pistol from him and in the struggle shot him.

Roland owned a 200-acre farm in Mitchell county, was independent and had been known as a thrifty, hardworking man. He never mixed much with others of his race, however, and never had a great liking for white people. After the shooting Sheriffs serene there.


