





"Press dispatches in today's newspapers report that more than two thousand Negroes have left Johnstown as a result of your order that only Negroes resident in the city for seven years would be allowed to relicemen and wounding of four others, these crimes alleged to have been Have you paid your subscription committed by Negroes. If the facts as reported above are correct National Association for the Advancement of Colored People with four hundred and fifty branches and membership of one hundred thousand, composed of members of both races, vigorously protest against this high-handed injustice in such wholesale deportation. It appears to us that you have totally exceeded authority vested in you. It is the duty of the mayor and the other authorities of Johnstown to seek out and punish the guilty instead of punishing men whose only offense is that their skins are black. We respectfully urge that the hounding of colored citizens be stopped and that the city of Johnstown cease making itself a tool for carrying out the threats of the Ku Klux Klan. JAMES WELDON JOHNSON
