ARTICLE XIV, CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Citizenship Rights Not to Be Abridged All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

A moment's thought will easily convince open-minded persons that the contribution of the Negro to American nationality as slave, freedman and citizen was far from negligible. No element of American life has so subtly and yet clearly woven itself into warp and woof of our thinking and acting as the American Negro. He came with the first explorers and helped in exploration. His labor was from the first the foundation of the American prosperity and the cause of the rapid growth of the new world in social and omic importance. Modern democracy rests not simply on the striving white men in Europe and America but also on the persistent struggle of the black men in America for two centuries. The military defense of this land has deded upon Negro soldiers from the time of the Colonial a down to the struggle of the World War. Not only does the Negro appear, reappear and persist in American litera-ture but a Negro American literature has arisen of deep significance, and Negro folk lore and music are among the choicest heritages of this land. By agreement between the executors of the estate of Rev. Charles Avery, who in 1849 established the Avery Trade School for Colored Youth at Allegheny, and the trustees of the University of Pittsburgh, the fund, established in 1875, is to provide instruction for the male colored people in the United States and the British provinces of Canada. The number is not to exceed twelve at any one time and no individual can hold a scholarship longer than four years.
