James Weldon Johnson, secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, announces that the American Fund for Public Service has provided two scholarships of five hundred dollars each to be awarded to colored students to attend Brookwood Labor College at

Katonah, New York. Brookwood College is designed for the scientific training of men and women who desire to be effective and useful in the labor and farmer movements, whether as rank and file member or as officials; and to give training in the technique of labor union administration and of activities such as speaking, writing, organzing teaching, in which they may be called upon to engage. In a word, Brookwood is established for the scientific training of leaders and workers in modern industry.
