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AN IMPORTANT WORD TO SUBSCRIBERS.

At the expiration of this period, where subscriptions are not renewed, the paper must be stopped. If this is not done, postal privileges are denied the publication. Those, therefore, who desire to continue receiving The Monitor must see to it that their subscriptions are paid, as the law requires, in advance. Statements are being sent to all those who owe, or our collector will calland unless your subscription is paid we will be compelled to cut off your paper which, of course, we do not want

We, as publishers, MUST comply with the law or pay the penalty.
