## Nolan Davis Runs Away At Track Meet

Pfc. Nolan Davis, stationed at Camp Leroy Johnson near New Orleans, La., placed in 10 out of 13 events he entered at an all-camp track meet last week, according to word received by Mrs. Lowell Davis of 724 No. 22, Nolan's mother. Davis, who has already established something of a record as an athlete at Lincoln high, placed first in the high jump, pole vault, 440 yard run, broad-jump and the horseshoe pitch. He placed second or third in the 100 yard dash, javelin throw and the 220 yard dash.

Pfc. Davis expects to be home on furlough sometime during March.

## Cleveland Adopts FEPC After Test

CLEVELAND. (ANP). The Cleveland City council approved a compulsory Fair Employment Practices Commission Plan last week by a 25 to 7 vote.

The ordinance bars employment discrimination on grounds of color, creed or national origin. It will become effective in 40 days. The plan was accepted after more than a year of local experimenting with a voluntary commission. During that period it was discovered that the entire city had much to gain by job equality for all citizens.

The ordinance makes Cleveland the fourth city to pass such a law. Other cities with similar plans are Philadelphia, Hartford and Chicago. However, there is some doubt as to the actual operations of the Chicago FEPC. Since its passage in 1945, little has been heard of it.

## Richmond Barthe Gets \$40,000 to Do Haiti Sculpture

NEW YORK. (ANP). An announcement was made last week that Richard Barthe, noted sculptor, has received a commission from the Haitian government to do works of sculpture of Dessalines and Toussaint L'Ouverture. The commission carries a fee of \$40,000.

## Sunday School Lesson

Before twelve o'clock on Friday young Jowett saw his way clear. All the rest of his life he followed much the same plan. He would lay a problem before the Lord and if he did not see the path of duty he would consult a Christian friend. Sooner or later Jowett saw the light. "He that willeth to do his will shall know." (John 7:17).

The Way to Solve a Church Problem. Verses 22-29. The "experts" at Jerusalem did not find the solution automatically, or immediately. Like physicians in a clinic, Peter and James had first to diagnose the case. They needed to ascertain the facts; so they heard both sides. Meeting behind closed doors, those leaders let the disputant talk things out. In many a city now such a dispute would get into the newspapers, but those leaders kept their problems within four walls.

The Beginnings of a Church Fight, Acts 15:1-6. Think about the church as a family. If a squabble continues the household may suffer a divorce. The trouble has sprung up because of outsiders. Men from Jerusalem have come to tell the brethren in Antioch how to run their church. All of this occurred far away and long ago, but the same issues confront us now. That church had to choose between Christian liberty and Jewish bondage.

Those brethren did not know how to deal with the problem. So they decided to consult experts elsewhere. When a physician does not know how to deal with a critical case he sends for expert counsel. This word "expert" means one who has gained knowledge and skill through practice of his art. In church matters the leading experts of that day lived at Jerusalem.

This plan works with young people. Everyone needs an expert counselor. In time of need a young man confers with an older man and a girl with a woman. Once John Henry Jowett had to make an important decision of a kind he had never faced. Not knowing what to do, he went to a minister named Berry. The latter listened until John had finished his tale. Then Betty said: "You have prayed and done everything else you should. Trust God to do His part. When do you have to decide?" "Before next Friday at noon." "Before Friday at noon you will know."

## Red Caps Fight Rise in Baggage Handling Rates

CHICAGO. (ANP). Willard S. Townsend, president of the CIO Red Caps union, sent a statement to the Interstate Commerce commission in Washington last Wednesday asking that a proposed 66 2/3 percent increase in rates for handling baggage by porters at major railroad terminals be disapproved.

Townsend pointed out that the increase from 15 to 25 cents a bag, would cut the use of red cap service. He suggested that porter expenses be absorbed by the railroads.

## Hassel Building Fund Reaches \$73; Needs More Help
