**Sinclair Lewis Dies in Rome**

ROME, Italy—(ANP)—Sinclair Lewis, author of "Kingsblood Royal," novel on prejudice against Negroes, died here in Rome last week following a short illness.

His body was placed in state at the Protestant cemetery chapel here where the great Shelley and Keats, English poets of the past, are buried.

Lewis would have been 66 on Feb. 7 if he had lived. He was alone at the time of his death in the Villa Elettra clinic in Rome. He had suffered from a chronic heart ailment, and also had been attacked by bronchial pneumonia, Dec. 31.

Recognized as one of the world's great social novelists, Lewis is most famed for his novel, "Main Street," published in 1920, and "Babbitt," published in 1922.

He wrote numerous other great novels attacking nearly every phase of American life during the '20's and early '30's.

In recent years, his most famous novel was "Kingsblood Royal" which attacked the racial problem in the United States. This book, a sensation and a shock to many Americans, reached the best seller lists. It was published in 1947.

Lewis had lived in Italy during the last two years of his life because he wanted to die here. He met his second wife, the famed newspaper columnist, Dorothy Thompson, here, and he also wrote "Babbitt" here.

**Stuffed Green Peppers**

4 medium-sized green peppers  
3 tablespoons fat  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 cup (8-ounce can) tomato sauce  
2 teaspoons meat extract and  
1 1/2 cups hot water or  
1 1/2 cups meat broth  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups ground cooked meat  
1/2 package pre-cooked rice (3/4 cup)  
Cut stem ends from green peppers and remove seeds. Cook in boiling salted water 5 minutes. Remove from water and place, cut side up, in baking dish.

Melt fat in saucepan. Add onion and saute until tender. Add flour and blend. Add tomato sauce, stirring constantly. Combine meat extract with water (or meat broth) and add to tomato sauce. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a boil. Combine 1 1/2 cups of the tomato mixture with salt, meat and rice.

Fill green peppers with rice mixture. Pour remaining gravy around green peppers in casserole. Cover and bake 20 minutes in a hot oven, 400 degrees. Uncover and bake 10 minutes longer. Serves 4.

**Date Cake**

1 cup chopped dates  
1 cup boiling water  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1 1/2 cups cake flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 cup chopped nut meats  
Cover dates with boiling

water; cool to lukewarm. Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add egg and vanilla; beat well. Add date mixture, then sifted dry ingredients; beat well. Add nut meats. Bake in waxed-paper-lined 8-inch square cake pan in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 35 to 40 minutes.

**Deep River Boys Walk Away From Plane Crash**

LONDON (ANP)—The Deep River Boys, popular singing group currently on tour of the British Isles, had a narrow escape from death here recently when the plane in which they were riding overran the Manches airport landing strip and crashed into a railway, fending.

The singers, accompanied by their manager, Ed Kirkeby, were flying from Dublin, Ireland to London, for a scheduled opening at Leeds Empire theatre. In the resulting crash of the plane, a wing was ripped off. No explosion occurred nor did the plane catch fire.
