Salmon au Gratin.

Fork together lightly three cups of salmon, two cups of mashed potatoes, six tablespoons milk, six tablespoons melted butter, and salt and pepper to taste. Pile lightly in a buttered baking dish. Sprinkle one-half cup of grated cheese over the top and buttered crumbs over the cheese. Brown in a moderate oven, 375 degrees, for about twenty minutes. Serves eight.

Stuffed Prunes

Wash and steam medium sized prunes. To steam, place them in a strainer over boiling water and let stand until well puffed, about five minutes. Cool and remove pits. Place a half or whole marshmallow (according to size of prune), in cavity, leaving the cut surface exposed. Roll in shredded coconut or powdered sugar.

Figs may be substituted for the prunes.

Dates may be stuffed with cut marshmallows.

Cheese Biscuit Ring.

Roll biscuit dough to an oblong sheet about 1-2 inch thick. Sprinkle it very generously with grated American cheese. Carefully roll it up, like a jelly roll, and bring the two ends together to form a ring. Place on a baking pan. With sharp scissors, cut thru the roll about two inches apart, from the outside of the ring two-thirds of the way toward the center. Each of the sections is turned over so that the outside is placed on the baking sheet, resembling a Swedish tea ring. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 400 degrees, until done and lightly browned. Serve hot.

Stuffed Tomato Salad.

3 firm ripe tomatoes
1/2 cup chopped cabbage
1-2 cup chopped celery
4 olives, chopped
2 tablespoons onions, chopped
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1-3 cup salad dressing
Peel and chill tomatoes. Scoop out part of the insides. Mix 3 tablespoons of dressing with rest of ingredients. Stuff tomato cases. Serve on lettuce and top with remaining dressing.

Noodle Ring.

1/2 pound noodles
6 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup soft bread, crumbled
2 tablespoons chopped onions
2 tablespoons chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers (optional)
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos
1/4 teaspoon chopped parsley
3 eggs, beaten
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon paprika
Break noodles and add to water

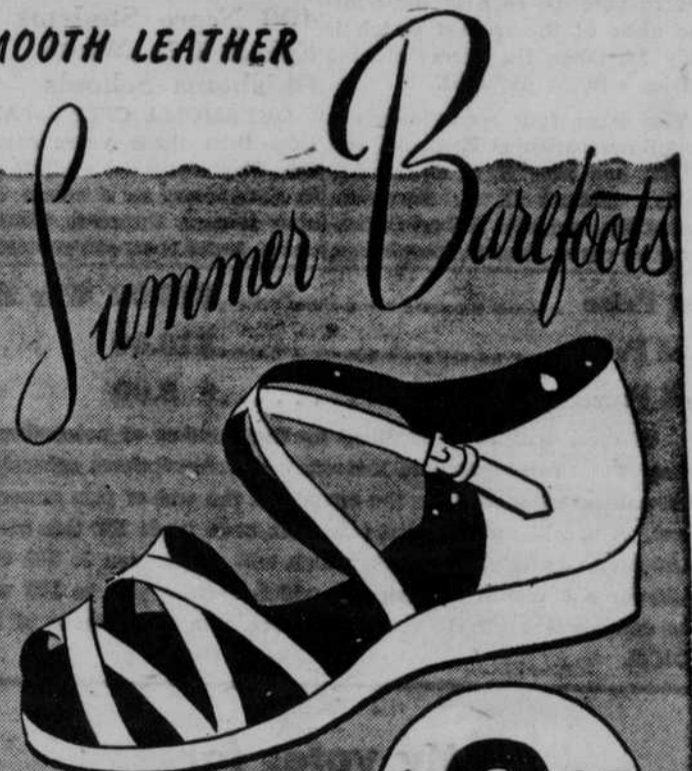
